### Key Facts

\*After the Celts, came the Romans.

\*The Romans first invaded Britain in 43AD and their rule ended in 410AD.

\*Boudicca was an important woman in history who fought against the Romans.

\*Julius Caesar attempted to invade Britain twice.

\*Romans invented many things that we still use today, including roads, aqueducts and under-floor heating.

\*Romans imported and exported many goods, including wine, olives, metal and salt.

\*Romans established a number of settlements, many of which still survive e.g. Bath, York, Chester, Colchester.

\*Christians and Jews were persecuted by the Romans until Christianity was introduced in 200AD by Emperor Constantine.

\*Mining and agriculture were very important to the economy.

\*The country was run by a governor, who was responsible for the military, road building and building relationships with local kings.

\*Hadrian's wall was 73 miles long and was built to guard the north-west frontier of the Roman Empire

\*After the Romans, came the Anglo-Saxons.
